City of Santa Clarita – Annexation No. 2003-03 (Whitney Canyon)

Agenda Item No. 3a

Agenda item No. 3a is a proposal requesting annexation of approximately 521.22 acres of uninhabited county territory to the City of Santa Clarita. The applicant of record is the City of Santa Clarita, the proposal having been initiated by City of Santa Clarita Resolution No. 03-30. The application was received on April 22, 2003.

Related Jurisdictional Changes: Annexation to the City of Santa Clarita and detachment from the Los Angeles County Road District No. 5. The proposal also includes amendment to the City of Santa Clarita sphere of influence.

Background: On July 23, 2002, the Santa Clarita Watershed Recreation and Conservation Authority (SCWRCA), a joint powers authority between the City of Santa Clarita and the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, purchased the Whitney Canyon Ranch site to provide the public with more open-space.

The City of Santa Clarita City Council appropriated \$300,000 from the General Fund to support maintenance of the area. Annexation would allow the City to bring the proposed Whitney Canyon area under municipal jurisdiction.

Purpose of Request: To allow the City of Santa Clarita municipal jurisdiction and governmental control of the subject territory.

Location: The subject territory is generally located east of State Route 14, east of the terminus of San Fernando Road, and adjacent to the existing City of Santa Clarita limits.

Factors of Consideration Pursuant to Government Code Section 56668

1. *Population:* There are currently no residents within the subject territory.
2. *Registered Voters/Landowners:* The County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk has certified that there are no registered voters residing within the proposal area. The Santa Clarita Watershed Recreation and Conservation Authority is the majority landowner.
3. *Topography, Natural Boundaries and Drainage Basins:* The area is characterized as being rugged with hillsides. The site is bounded by the Angeles National Forest to the east and south and within the eastern portion of the proposal site, Placerita Canyon Road to the north and Elsmere Canyon to the south, and the City of Santa Clarita limits and State Route 14 to the west.

4. *Zoning, Present and Future Land Use:* The subject territory is currently vacant and used as open space. The City of Santa Clarita will continue to utilize the area as open space.

The current Los Angeles County Santa Clarita Valley Areawide General Plan designation is N2 (Non-Urban), HM (Hillside Management), and NF (National Forest).

The property is currently zoned in the Los Angeles County Zoning Code as A-2-1 (Heavy Agriculture), which allows for low density residential, A-2-5 (Agriculture), and W (Watershed).

The City of Santa Clarita General Plan and Pre-zoning ordinance designates the proposal area as OS (Open Space) with a MOCA (Mineral/Oil Conservation Area) overlay.

5. *Surrounding Land Use:* North, south, and east of the property site is vacant land. Residential land uses, a cemetery, and freeway-oriented commercial uses are located in the vicinity west of State Route 14.
6. *Pre-zoning and Conformance with the General Plan:* The City of Santa Clarita adopted a General Plan Amendment and pre-zone ordinance for the area (Resolution No. 03-27) designating the zoning as OS (Open Space) with a MOCA (Mineral/Oil Conservation Area) overlay on the eastern 163 acre portion. The proposal is consistent with the City of Santa Clarita General Plan.
7. *CEQA:* As Lead Agency, the City of Santa Clarita adopted a Negative Declaration for the project on February 11, 2003, Resolution No. 03-27.
8. *Assessed Value, Tax Transfer:*
The total net assessed land value is \$3,471,522. All agencies have adopted a tax transfer resolution.
9. *Governmental Services and Control, Availability and Adequacy:* The County of Los Angeles currently provides services to the area. Services will be provided to the subject territory at the same level or greater level by the City of Santa Clarita and in joint partnership with the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy upon approval of this annexation proposal.
10. *Effects on Agricultural and Open-Spaced Lands:*
The proposal does not impact agricultural land and proposes to maintain the area as open-space.

11. *Boundaries and Lines of Assessment:*

The boundaries of this territory have been clearly defined and correspond to lines of assessment or ownership. This proposal does not create any new islands of unincorporated county territory.

12. *Effects of the Proposal on Adjacent Areas and the County:* The proposed annexation will have no effect on the surrounding areas or the County. The alternative governmental option would be to deny annexation of the subject territory, which would remain within County jurisdiction. Denial would result in no evident changes.

13. *Sphere of Influence:*

The subject territory is located east of the City's boundaries and outside of its existing sphere of influence; therefore, an amendment to the City of Santa Clarita's sphere is required.

14. *Correspondence:*

No correspondence has been received regarding this annexation request.

Conclusion

Staff recommends approval of this annexation request. The annexation is a logical and reasonable extension of the City of Santa Clarita boundary.

Recommendation:

- 1) Open the public hearing and receive testimony on the proposed annexation.
- 2) There being no further testimony, close the public hearing.
- 3) Acting in its role as a responsible agency with respect to Annexation No. 2003-03 pursuant to State of California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines Section 15096, LAFCO certifies that it has independently considered and reached its own conclusions regarding the environmental effects of the proposed project and the environmental documents adopted by the City of Santa Clarita as lead agency, namely City of Santa Clarita Resolution No. 03-27, approving and adopting a Negative Declaration for the annexation area. LAFCO finds that it has complied with the requirements of CEQA with respect to the process for a responsible agency, and hereby adopts by reference the Negative Declaration, previously adopted by the City of Santa Clarita, in connection with its approval of the proposed project.

- 3) Find that the county and all subject agencies have agreed to the proposed tax transfer.
- 4) Approve the requested amendment to the Sphere of Influence for the City of Santa Clarita and make the following determinations, in accordance with Government Code Section 56425.

- a. Present and planned land uses in the area:

The subject territory is currently vacant and used as open space. The City of Santa Clarita will continue to utilize the area as open space. There are no plans for future development.

- b. Present and probable need for public facilities and services:

There are adequate public facilities to service the Whitney Canyon area. The subject territory is currently uninhabited. No development is anticipated.

- c. The present capacity of public facilities:

Adequate public service facilities are available to service the site.

Fire: The Los Angeles County Fire Department currently services the area and will continue to do so under contract with the City of Santa Clarita. No change in the level and range of services is anticipated.

Parks/Recreation: The area is generally open-space with hiking activities that are managed by the Santa Monica Mountain Conservancy.

Police Services: The area is currently serviced by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, and the Santa Monica Mountain Conservancy Park Rangers. The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department will continue to provide the service under contract with the City; however, the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy will provide routine policing.

Sewer Services: Sewer services are provided by way of a private septic tank that is maintained and serviced by the City of Santa Clarita.

Water: Water is provided by private well that is maintained and serviced by the City of Santa Clarita. Water is currently available on site and will be upon annexation.

- d. The existence of any social or economic communities of interest:
There are no communities of social or economic interest.

**RESOLUTION OF THE LOCAL AGENCY FORMATION
COMMISSION FOR LOS ANGELES COUNTY
MAKING DETERMINATIONS APPROVING AND ORDERING
"ANNEXATION NO. 2003-03 (WHITNEYCANYON)"
TO THE CITY OF SANTA CLARITA;
AND AMENDING THE SPHERE OF INFLUENCE OF THE CITY OF SANTA CLARITA**

WHEREAS, an application for the proposed annexation of certain territory to the City of Santa Clarita in the County of Los Angeles and request for amendment of the City's sphere of influence has been filed with the Executive Officer of the Local Agency Formation Commission for Los Angeles County (the "Commission"), pursuant to Title 5, Division 3, commencing with section 56000, the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000; and

WHEREAS, the proposed annexation consists of 521.22 ± acres of uninhabited unincorporated county territory and is assigned the following distinctive short form designation: "Annexation No. 2003-03 to the City of Santa Clarita;" and

WHEREAS, the principal reason for this annexation is to allow municipal jurisdiction and governmental control over open-spaced territory owned by the Santa Clarita Watershed Recreation and Conservation Authority (SCWRCA), a joint powers authority with the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy and the City of Santa Clarita; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer has reviewed the proposal and submitted to the Commission a report, including his recommendations thereon; and

WHEREAS, on January 12, 2004, after being duly and properly noticed, this proposal came on for hearing at which time this Commission heard and received all oral and written testimony, objections and evidence which were made, presented or filed, and all persons present were given an opportunity to hear and be heard with respect to this proposal and the report of the Executive Officer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

1. The Commission, acting in its role as the a responsible agency with respect to City of Santa Clarita Annexation No. 2003-03, pursuant to State of California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines Section 15096, LAFCO certifies that it has independently considered and reached its own conclusions regarding the environmental effects of the proposed project and the environmental documents adopted by the City of Santa Clarita as lead agency, namely City of Santa Clarita Resolution No. 03-27, approving and adopting a Negative Declaration for the annexation area. LAFCO finds that it has complied with the requirements of CEQA with respect to the process for a responsible agency, and hereby adopts by reference the Negative Declaration, previously adopted by the City of Santa Clarita, in connection with its approval of the proposed project.
2. The Commission hereby amends the Sphere of Influence of the City of Santa Clarita and makes the following determinations in accordance with the Government Code Section 56425:
 - a. Present and planned land uses in the area:

The subject territory is currently vacant and used as open space. The City of Santa Clarita will continue to utilize the area as open space. There are no plans for future development.
 - b. Present and probable need for public facilities and services:

There are adequate public facilities to service the Whitney Canyon area. The subject territory is currently uninhabited. No development is anticipated.
 - c. The present capacity of public facilities:

Adequate public service facilities are available to service the site.

Fire: The Los Angeles County Fire Department currently services the area and will continue to do so under contract with the City of Santa Clarita. No change in the level and range of services is anticipated.

Parks/Recreation: The area is generally open-space with hiking activities that are managed by the Santa Monica Mountain Conservancy.

Police Services: The area is currently serviced by the Los Angeles County

Sheriff's Department, and the Santa Monica Mountain Conservancy Park Rangers. The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department will continue to provide the service under contract with the City; however, the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy will provide routine policing.

Sewer Services: Sewer services are provided by way of a private septic tank that is maintained and serviced by the City of Santa Clarita.

Water: Water is provided by private well that is maintained and serviced by the City of Santa Clarita. Water is currently available on site and will be upon annexation.

- d. The existence of any social or economic communities of interest:
There are no communities of social or economic interest.
3. A description of the boundaries and map of the proposal, as approved by this Commission, is set forth in Exhibits A and B, attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein.
4. The subject territory consists of 521.22 acres, is uninhabited, and is assigned the following distinctive short form designation:

“City of Santa Clarita Annexation No. 2003-03”
5. The Commission hereby approves the annexation subject to the following terms and conditions:
 - a. Annexation of the subject territory to the City of Santa Clarita.
 - b. Detachment of the subject territory from Los Angeles County Road District No. 5
 - c. The territory so annexed shall be subject to the payment of such service charges, assessments or taxes as the City of Santa Clarita may legally impose.
 - d. The regular County assessment roll is utilized by the City of Santa Clarita.
 - e. The territory will not be taxed for existing bonded indebtedness of the City of Santa Clarita.
6. The Commission shall initiate and conduct protest proceedings pursuant to Government Code Section 57000, *et seq.*

7. The Executive Officer is hereby authorized and directed to mail certified copies of this

resolution in the manner and as provided in Government Code Section 56882 .

Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40 Request for Approval of an Out-of-Agency Water Service Agreement - KB Home Greater Los Angeles Inc.

Agenda Item No. 3b

The item before you is a request by Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40 (the District) for approval of an out-of-agency water service agreement with the KB Homes Greater Los Angeles Inc. (KB Homes), pursuant to Government Code Section 56133(b).

Proposal: The subject territory consists of a 9.5 acre parcel located at the southwest corner of 30th Street East and Avenue K, in the City of Lancaster. The existing approved tentative map allows for construction of 44 detached single family residences.

Issues: On August 13, 2004 an application was filed by KB Homes to annex the 9.5 acre parcel to the District. At that time staff had estimated the annexation process would take no longer than six months to complete. However, due to unforeseen delays with Los Angeles County's approval of the joint tax resolution, the annexation completion date has been extended for an additional 3 to 4 months. In the mean time KB Homes is the process of building out Tract 54365 (an infill community). This tract completes a loop of another tract that is currently served by Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40.

As homes will be available for occupancy prior to completion of the annexation, the District has requested Commission's approval to contract with KB Home to provide residential water related services outside its municipal boundary in anticipation of approval of the annexation proposal.

Sphere of Influence: The subject territory is currently within the sphere of influence of the District.

CEQA: The City of Lancaster, as lead agency, has adopted a Negative Declaration for this project and made a determination that the project will not have a significant impact on the environment..

Recommended Action

1. Open hearing and receive public testimony.
2. Close hearing.

3. Acting in its role as a responsible agency with respect to approval of this project, and under State CEQA Guidelines Section 15096, LAFCO certifies that it has independently considered and reached its own conclusions regarding the environmental effects of the project and the negative declaration adopted by the City of Lancaster, as lead agency, and has determined that the document adequately addresses the environmental impacts of the project. LAFCO finds that it has complied with the requirements of CEQA with respect to the process for a responsible agency and hereby adopts, by reference, the negative declaration, previously prepared by the lead agency, in connection with its approval of the project.

4. Pursuant to Government Code Section 56133(b), authorize Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40 to provide new or extended services outside jurisdictional boundaries but within its sphere of influence in anticipation of a later change of organization, and to enter into an out-of-agency water service agreement with KB Home Greater Los Angeles, Inc.

Upon receipt of any proposed change of organization or reorganization that includes the annexation of territory to any district, if the proposal is not filed by the district to which annexation of territory is proposed, Government Code section 56857 require LAFCO to place the proposal on its agenda for informational purpose only. Within 60 days of the meeting date, the annexing district may adopt and submit to LAFCO a resolution requesting termination of the annexation proceedings. The law requires that the annexing district "present written findings supported by substantial evidence in the record that the termination request is justified by a financial or service related concern." Prior to the commission's determination of termination of proceedings the resolution is subject to judicial review.

Waiver of 60-Day Termination Period

Under Section 56857, LAFCO may not hear and consider the proposed annexation until the 60-day termination period has expired. The code provides, however, that the commission may waive the 60-day termination period if the annexing district adopts and submits to LAFCO a resolution supporting the change of organization or reorganization.

The following is a summary of annexation proposals filed with LAFCO:

a). **County Waterworks District No. 40 - Annexation No. 2004-26**

Project Description

On December 13, 2004, A.V. Land LLC filed a landowner petition for annexation of 47.05 acres of vacant land to Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40.

Project Location

The subject territory is located on the northeast corner of Avenue K and 30th Street East, in the City of Lancaster.

b). **County Waterworks District No. 40 - Annexation No. 2004-27**

Project Description

On December 17, 2004, Gemstar Properties LLC filed a landowner petition for annexation of 20.24 acres of vacant land to Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40.

Project Location

The subject territory fronts 30th Street West, approximately 1,349 feet north of Avenue I, in the City of Lancaster.

c) **County Waterworks District No. 40 – Annexation No. 2004-28**

Project Description

On December 31, 2004, the City of Lancaster Redevelopment Agency filed a landowner petition for annexation of 193.5 acres of land to Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40.

Project Location

The subject territory is located between 80th Street West and 90th Street West and Avenue H and Avenue H-4, City of Lancaster.

d) **County Waterworks District No. 40 – Annexation No. 2004-29**

Project Description

On December 20, 2004, A.V. Land LLC filed a landowner petition for annexation of 40.93 acres of vacant land to Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40.

Project Location

The subject territory is located in the vicinity of Avenue J and 30th Street East, in the City of Lancaster.

e) **County Waterworks District No. 40 – Annexation No. 2004-30**

Project Description

On December 29, 2004, landowners A.V. Land LLC and Tiferet LLC filed landowner petitions for annexation of 30.49 acres of vacant land to Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 40.

Project Location

The subject territory is located in the vicinity of Lancaster Blvd. and 30th Street West, in the City of Lancaster.

MSR/SOI UPDATE

Agenda Item No. 4b

1. Preparation of the SOI & MSR reports, by staff and consultants, for the 88 cities and 92 districts located in Los Angeles County, continue on schedule. To date, the Commission has adopted SOI Updates and MSR reports on 74 local agencies (26 cities and 48 special districts).

2. **Santa Clara**

A Community Workshop was held on November 30, 2004. The *Final Municipal Service Review for the Santa Clara Region* and Dudek's *Final MSR for Water Service Providers in the Santa Clara Region* have been completed. The public hearing for both MSRs is scheduled for the next Commission hearing on January 26, 2005. The Commission is expected to take separate action on the MSR and SOI update for the City of Santa Clarita today. Although the Dudek report is final, SOI updates for the water agencies will not be acted on until the new study is completed. As discussed at our last meeting, the new study is a collaborative effort between all the water agencies in the region, and will be more in-depth.

3. **Wasterwater**

In regard to the 25 County Sanitation Districts, the low bidder, LSA Associates has been selected and the contract has been awarded. LSA provided us with a timeline for completion of the Wastewater MSR as follows:

- LSA Wasterwater MSR preliminary draft completion- February 14, 2005
- Public distribution of LSA Draft - February 21, 2005
- LSA Watewater Draft MSR Community Workshop - March 21, 2005
- LSA Final Wastewaster MSR - March 28, 2005
- Public Hearing - LSA Final Wasterwater MSR - April 13, 2005

4. South Bay

Staff has been working diligently on the completion of the South Bay Municipal Service review, which includes 14 cities. Dudek is also working concurrently on the MSR for water service providers in the South Bay region. There are two water districts for the South Bay, the West Basin and the Water Replenishment District of Southern California. The timeline for the completion of both MSRs is as follows:

- Completion of Dudek Draft Water MSR for the South Bay Region - January 24, 2005
- Completion of South Bay Region MSR Draft - February 28, 2005
- Public distribution of Dudek Draft Water MSR and Draft South Bay Regional MSR - week of March 4, 2005
- Community Workshop for South Bay MSRs - week of April 12, 2005
- Completion of Final South Bay Region MSRs – week of May 2, 2005
- Public Hearing – South Bay Regional and Water MSRs – May 25, 2005

5. East San Gabriel

Staff is in the process of sending all files and information to Burr Consulting. Completion of the East San Gabriel MSR is tentatively scheduled for July 2005.
