10 COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

Commissioner Spence stated that he recently attended the League of California Cities 2015 Annual Conference & Expo in San Jose between September 30th and October 1st. He stated that he attended a panel called "What City Council-Members Need to Know About LAFCO", presented by Commissioner Judy Mitchell, E.O. Paul Novak, and San Benito LAFCO Executive Officer, Bob Braitman. Commissioner Spence asked the E.O. to elaborate about a question that arose relative to a proposed city incorporation in Placer County. The E.O. stated that there is an incorporation effort in Placer County to incorporate the community of Olympic Valley; several of the proponents for the cityhood of Olympic Valley are not pleased with certain decisions made by Placer LAFCO concerning the proposed incorporation. The E.O. stated that members of the audience asked whether Placer LAFCO was adhering to the direction in "A Guide to the LAFCO Process for Incorporations" issued by the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR). The E.O. noted that he and Executive Officer Bob Braitman found it challenging to answer these questions.

Commissioner Close asked the E.O. if there are any upcoming controversial matters pertaining to Los Angeles LAFCO. The E.O. stated that the City of Claremont has filed an eminent domain action to acquire a private water company. The private water company's territory includes the City of Claremont, Los Angeles County unincorporated areas, portions of the Cities of Pomona, La Verne, Montclair, and parts of unincorporated territory in San Bernardino County. The E.O. stated that, should Claremont's condemnation succeed, and given the multiple jurisdictions involved, this could result in a proposal or proposals being submitted to Los Angeles LAFCO, San Bernardino LAFCO, or both. Also, the E.O. stated that the City of Calabasas filed an annexation (2014-04), near its boundary with the City of Agoura Hills, which has generated opposition from residents living in Agoura Hills.

At the state level, the E.O. stated that CALAFCO anticipates a great deal of LAFCO-related legislation in the year 2016. The CALAFCO Legislative Committee's first meeting will be in November, at which time the Committee will address what legislation is expected from the Assembly and Senate. The E.O. stated that he will report back to the Commission at a later meeting. Commissioner Close asked the E.O. what legislative issues he will anticipate. The E.O. stated that the focus is likely to be water-related issues, as well as how to address issues involving Government Code Section 56133 on Out-of-Agency Service Extensions. If a city or special district wants to provide service outside its jurisdictional boundary, there are only two circumstances where the Commission can approve Out-of-Agency Service Extensions: one, is on the condition that the territory will be annexed at a later date; and two, that there is an imminent health and safety concern. The E.O. stated that, due to these limitations, Napa and San Bernardino LAFCOs have been unable to formulate solutions to address failed water companies;

due to these challenges, a recently-adopted bill (AB 402) enacted a 5-year pilot program, which will allow Napa and San Bernardino LAFCOs to approve such extensions based on other criteria. Depending on the outcome in those two counties, there may be future discussion of broadening this authority for all LAFCOs statewide.

For Parcel 1 (existing single-family home in the city of San Dimas), the proposal is categorically exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15319(a) because the annexation consists of areas containing existing structures developed to the density allowed by the current zoning. A Categorical Exemption was adopted by Los Angeles County Sanitation District No.

22, as lead agency, on January 28, 2015.

For Parcel 2 (the 15 proposed single-family homes in the city of La Verne), the CEQA clearance is an Environmental Impact Report certified by the City of La Verne, as lead

agency, on June 17, 2009.

Additional Information:

The proposed annexation to Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22 involves two separate parcels. One parcel is in the city of San Dimas and one parcel is in the city of La Verne.

FACTORS TO BE CONSIDERED PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE 56668:

a. Population:

The existing population is 6 residents as of February 3, 2015. The population density is 0.15 persons per acre.

The estimated future population is 40 residents.

The affected territory is 40.789+/- acres. The existing land use consists of one existing single-family home (Parcel 1). The proposed/future land use is 15 single-family homes (Parcel 2).

The assessed valuation is \$1,700,099 as of February 3, 2015. The per capita assessed valuation is \$283,349.83.

On May 19, 2015, the County adopted a negotiated tax exchange resolution; all other involved public agencies have adopted a property tax transfer resolution.

The topography of the affected territory is flat.

There are no natural boundaries.

There are no drainage basins on or near the affected territory.

The affected territory is surrounded by populated areas on all sides.

The affected territory is likely to experience modest growth in the next ten years. The adjacent areas are likely to experience no growth in the next ten years.

b. Governmental Services and Controls:

The affected territory includes one existing single-family home and 15 proposed single-family homes which require organized governmental services. The affected territory will require governmental services indefinitely.

The present cost and adequacy of governmental services and controls in the area are acceptable. With respect to sanitary sewage disposal, other than service provided by the District, the only alternative is private septic systems. The cost of sewage disposal by the District versus the cost by septic system is subject to multiple factors and varies widely. Service by the District is considered to be more reliable than septic systems. Service by the District is environmentally superior in terms of wastewater treatment, effluent discharge, and impacts on surface water bodies and groundwater.

c. Proposed Action and Alternative Actions:

The proposed action will have no effect on adjacent areas. The proposed action will have no effect on mutual social and economic interests. The proposal has no impact on the local governmental structure of the County.

The only alternate action for sewage disposal is a private septic system. Service by the District is considered to be more reliable than septic systems. Service by the District is environmentally superior in terms of wastewater treatment, effluent discharge, and impacts on surface water bodies and groundwater.

d. Conformity with Commission Policies on Urban Development and Open Space Conversion Policies:

There are no conformance issues because the Commission has not adopted any policies relative to providing planned, orderly, efficient patterns of urban development.

There is no prime agricultural land within or adjacent to the affected territory. The proposal conforms with the objectives in Government Code Sections 56377(a) and 56377(b).

e. Agricultural Lands:

There are no effects on agricultural lands, as defined. None of the land within the affected territory is currently used for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity for commercial purposes. According to the California Department of Conservation, Division of Land Resource Protection, none of the land within the affected territory is subject to a Land Conservation Act (aka "Williamson Act") contract nor in a Farmland Security Zone (California Land Conservation Act 2012 Status Report).

f. Boundaries:

The boundaries of the affected territory have been clearly defined by the applicant, and these boundaries have been reviewed and approved by LAFCO's GIS/Mapping Technician.

The boundaries conform to lines of assessment or ownership, and these boundaries have been reviewed and approved by LAFCO's GIS/Mapping Technician.

As a special district annexation, the proposal has no impact on existing city-county boundaries, nor does it create islands or corridors of unincorporated territory.

g. Consistency with Regional Transportation Plan:

The proposal has no significant impact upon, and is therefore consistent with, the Regional Transportation Plan.

h. Consistency with Plans:

The proposal is consistent with the existing City's General Plan designation of Single Family Very Low Estate. (For Parcel 1 in the City of San Dimas).

The proposal is consistent with the existing City's General Plan designation of Residential and vacant residential. (For Parcel 2 in the City of La Verne).

Pre-zoning is not a requirement for a special district proposal.

i. Sphere of Influence:

The affected territory is within the Sphere of Influence of the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22.

j. Comments from Public Agencies:

Staff did not receive any significant comments from public agencies or any resolutions raising objections from any affected agency.

k. Ability to Provide Services:

Although the present area is not currently serviced by the District, the area was included in the future service area that might be served by the District. The District's future wastewater management needs were addressed in the Joint Outfall system 2010 Master Facilities Plan.

l. Timely Availability of Water Supplies:

There are no known issues regarding water supply or delivery.

m. Regional Housing:

As a special district annexation, the proposal will not affect any city, nor the county, in achieving their respective fair shares of the regional housing needs as determined by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG).

n. Comments from Landowners, Voters, or Residents:

Staff did not receive any significant comments from landowners, voters, or residents.

o. Land Use Designations

The proposal is consistent with the existing City's General Plan designation of Single Family Very Low Estate. (For Parcel 1 in the City of San Dimas).

The proposal is consistent with the existing City's General Plan designation of Residential and vacant residential. (For Parcel 2 in the City of La Verne).

The proposal is consistent with the existing City's zoning designation of Single Family Hillside (For Parcel 1 in the City of San Dimas)

The proposal is consistent with the existing City's zoning designation of Specific Plan 81-4 Amended (For Parcel 2 in the City of La Verne).

p. Environmental Justice:

All of the owners of real property within the affected territory have requested, in writing, that the District provide off-site sewage disposal service. Property-owners of adjacent areas did not request such service, and/or were contacted by Sanitation District staff and were not interested in securing such service or did not respond. The proposal promotes environmental justice, in that there is fair treatment of people of all races, cultures, and incomes with respect to the location of public facilities and the provision of public services. There are no Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities (DUCs) within or adjacent to the affected territory.

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT (CEQA) CLEARANCE:

For Parcel 1 (existing single-family home in the city of San Dimas), the proposal is categorically exempt from the provisions of CEQA pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15319(a) because the annexation consists of areas containing existing structures developed to the density allowed by the current zoning. In addition, there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, nor other limiting factors that would make the exemption inapplicable based on the proposal records. A Categorical Exemption was adopted by Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22, as lead agency, on January 28, 2015.

For Parcel 2 (the 15 proposed single-family homes in the city of La Verne), the CEQA clearance is an Environmental Impact Report certified by the City of La Verne, as lead agency, on June 17, 2009. The Commission is a responsible agency pursuant to CEQA and State CEQA Guidelines Section 15096.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends approval of the proposal as a logical and reasonable extension of Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22 which will be for the interest of landowners and/or present and/or future inhabitants within the district and within the annexation territory.

Recommended Action:

- 1. Open the protest hearing and receive written protests;
- 2. Close the protest hearing;
- 3. Instruct the Executive Officer, pursuant to Government Code Section 57075, to determine the value of written protests filed and not withdrawn and report back to the Commission with the results; and
- 4. Based upon the results of the protest hearing, either adopt a resolution terminating the annexation proceedings if a majority protest exists pursuant to Government Code Section 57078, or ordering Annexation No. 420 to Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22 if written protests have been filed and not withdrawn by owners of land who own less than 50 percent of the total assessed value of land within the affected territory.

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22 (District) adopted a resolution of application to initiate proceedings, which was submitted to the Local Agency Formation Commission for the County of Los Angeles (Commission), pursuant to, Division 3, Title 5, of the California Government Code (commencing with section 56000, the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000), for annexation of territory herein described to the District, all within the City of San Dimas and City of La Verne; and

WHEREAS, the proposed annexation consists of approximately 40.789± acres of uninhabited territory and is assigned the following distinctive short-form designation:

"Annexation No. 420 to the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22"; and

WHEREAS, a description of the boundaries and map of the proposal are set forth in Exhibits "A" and "B", attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the principal reason for the proposed annexation is for the District to provide off-site sewage disposal to 1 existing single-family home and 15 proposed single-family homes; and

WHEREAS, on October 14, 2015, the Commission approved Annexation No. 420 to the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 57002, the Commission set the protest hearing for November 18, 2015 at 9:00 a.m., at the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors Hearing Room, Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration Room 381-B, located at 500 West Temple Street, Los Angeles, California, 90012; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer has given notice of the protest hearing pursuant to Government Code Sections 56150-56160, 56660-56661, 57025, and 57026, wherein the protest hearing notice was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County of Los Angeles on October 26, 2015, which is at least 21 days prior to the protest hearing, and said hearing notice was also mailed to all required recipients by first-class mail on or before the date of newspaper publication; and

WHEREAS, at the time and place fixed in the notice, the hearing was held, and any and all oral or written protests, objections, and evidence were received and considered; and

WHEREAS, the Commission, acting as the conducting authority, has the ministerial duty of tabulating the value of protests filed and not withdrawn and either terminating these proceeding if a majority protest exists or ordering the annexation directly; and the Commission has received a report and recommendations on adoption of a conforming resolution from its Executive Officer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

 The Commission finds that the number of property owners is 4, and the total assessed value of land within the affected territory is \$1,700,099.

- 2. The Commission finds that the number of written protests filed in opposition to Annexation No. 420 to the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22 and not withdrawn is _0_, which, even if valid, represents owners of land who own less than 50 percent of the assessed value of land within the affected territory.
- 3. A description of the boundaries and map of the proposal, as approved by this Commission, are set forth in Exhibits "A" and "B", attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein.
- 4. The affected territory consists of 40.789± acres, is uninhabited, and is assigned the following short form designation:

"Annexation No. 420 to the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22"

- 5. Annexation No. 420 to the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22 is hereby approved, subject to the following terms and conditions:
 - a. - h. Except to the extent in conflict with "a" through "g", above, the general terms and conditions contained in Chapter 2 of Part 5, Division 3, Title 5 of the California Government Code (commencing with Government Code Section 57325) shall apply to this annexation.
- 6. The Commission herby orders the uninhabited territory described in Exhibits "A" and "B" annexed to the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 22.
- 7. The Executive Officer is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the District, upon the District's payment of the applicable fees required by Government Code Section 54902.5 and prepare, execute and file a certificate of completion with the appropriate public agencies, pursuant to Government Code Section 57200, et seq.



Staff Report

Legislative Update

This report updates the Commission on adopted bills in the California Legislature which amend LAFCO law in the Cortese-Knox –Hertzberg Act directly, or which require proposals to be filed with LAFCO, and therefore may impact LA LAFCO.

Summary of key bills monitored and their current status:

- <u>AB 851 (Mayes) -- Disincorporations</u> was signed into law by Governor Brown on September 21, 2015 and takes effect on January 1, 2016. The bill creates new requirements and clarifies existing requirements for applicants seeking a disincorporation and LAFCOs reviewing such a request.
 - Effect of AB 851 upon LAFCO: The bill impacts LAFCO to the extent that a city in Los Angeles County files for disincorporation. To date, staff has not been approached by a city considering disincorporation, nor is staff only aware of any city actively considering disincorporation. Should a disincorporation proposal be filed, AB 851 requires more information, including a plan for services, to be submitted to LAFCO earlier in the disincorporation process, requires that LAFCO prepare a Comprehensive Fiscal Analysis (CFA) be prepared (as is the case for city incorporation proposals), and requires the Commission make specified determinations when approving a disincorporation.
- SB 485 (Hernandez) Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts was signed into law by Governor Brown on October 9, 2015 and takes effect on January 1, 2016. The bill "authorizes specified sanitation districts in Los Angeles County to acquire, construct, operate, maintain, and furnish facilities for the purpose of: diverting stormwater and dry weather runoff from the stormwater drainage system; managing and treating stormwater and dry weather runoff; discharging the water into the stormwater drainage system or rivers, lakes, oceans and other watercourses; and beneficial use of the water" (SB 485 Staff Analysis, Senate Committee on Governance and Finance, May 6, 2015).
 - Effect of AB 851 upon LAFCO: "The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act requires special districts to obtain the approval of the local agency formation commission (LAFCO) before they can activate one of their latent powers. The Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts must apply to the Los Angeles County LAFCO before it can use the new latent power granted by SB 485" (SB 485 Staff Analysis, Senate Committee on Governance and Finance, May 6, 2015). Staff expects the Los

Angeles County Sanitation Districts to file proposals (to active latent powers) for each of the 24 sanitation districts in Los Angeles County in early 2016. Based upon our discussions with CSD staff, we anticipate that these proposals will be filed in January, 2016, and they will appear on the Commission's agenda in March or April of 2016.

• SB 239 Service Extensions for Fire Protection (Hertzberg) was signed into law by Governor Brown on October 10, 2015 and takes effect on January 1, 2016. SB 239 requires LAFCO to review a contract or agreement for new or extended fire service outside of a city or special district's existing service area (under current law, if such an agreement is between two public agencies, it is exempt from LAFCO approval pursuant to Government Code Section 56133.e). In advance of filing the proposal with LAFCO, the applicant must either (a) obtain a written agreement validated and executed by each affected public agency and recognized employee organization that represents firefighters of the existing and proposed service providers consenting to the proposed fire protection contract, or (b) conduct an open and public hearing after providing notice to these agencies and employee organizations. The applicant must provide LAFCO with a plan for services, and an independent Comprehensive Fiscal Analysis (CFA).

Effect of SB 239 upon LA LAFCO: Pursuant to Commission policy (adopted February 11, 2015, and revised May 13, 2015), contracts between two public agencies for new or extended fire services would currently need to be approved as exempt from LAFCO review and approval. SB 239 makes such agreements, when they involve new or extended fire service outside of a city or special district's existing service area, subject to LAFCO review and approval, and could therefore increase the number of applications to LAFCO. That being said, LAFCO has not received any such requests over the last five years (although it is possible that some parties may not be aware of LAFCO's policy and simply did not submit a proposal to LAFCO), so any increase will likely be modest. Additionally, because SB 239 re-numbered certain provisions and made other small, technical changes to Government Code Section 56133 (as did AB 402, below), staff will review the final version when codification occurs (expected in December). This will likely result in a future agenda item before the Commission to revise your policy in accordance with the revised version of Government Code Section 56133. Finally, staff is not certain whether SB 239 will encourage other parties to pursue similar changes to Government Code Section 56133, which could also impact LAFCO's workload. Staff notes that SB 239 will have the biggest impact upon applicants, which now face additional, costly requirements when applying for new or extended fire services.

• AB 402 (Dodd) -- Local Agency services/Contracts was signed into law by Governor Brown on October 2, 2015 and takes effect on January 1, 2016. Under current law, a city or special district may extend services outside its jurisdictional boundaries upon receiving approval from LAFCO, and only under the following circumstances: one, the affected territory is within the city or district's SOI, and the city or district agrees to annex the affected territory at a later date; or two, the affected territory is outside the city or district's SOI and there is a documented threat to public health and safety. AB 402 creates a five-year "pilot program" in the Counties of Napa and San Bernardino under which LAFCO may also approve service extensions outside jurisdictional boundaries and SOIs if LAFCO makes several determinations: one, that a service deficiency was identified and evaluated in an MSR; two, that the extension will not result in adverse impacts on open space or agricultural lands; and three, that the service extension will not have growth-inducing impacts. AB 402 was originally drafted to apply statewide but was limited in scope after several LAFCOs objected.

Effect of AB 402 upon LAFCO: Because the law creates a pilot program exclusively in Napa County and in San Bernardino County, there is no immediate impact upon LAFCO. The efficacy of these pilot programs may (or may not) spur future legislation applicable to all LAFCOs.

Because it was addressed exhaustively in previous reports to the Commission, this report does not address the provisions of the CALAFCO's annual Omnibus Bill (AB 1532).
