1 CALL MEETING TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 9:03 a.m. in Room 381-B of the County Hall of Administration by First Vice-Chair Donald Dear.

The following item was called up for consideration:

a. Fiscal Year 2015-2016 Audit.

The E.O. summarized the staff report on Fiscal Year 2015-2016 Audit.

Jennifer Farr, Principal with Davis Farr LLP Certified Public Accountants (Davis Farr), gave a brief presentation about the audit findings. Ms. Farr stated that Davis Farr, on November 23, 2016, issued an Unmodified Audit Opinion, which is the highest level of opinion an entity can receive. Ms. Farr referenced a letter that was addressed to the Commissioners that identified the auditor's findings. This letter stated that there were no significant deficiencies or material weaknesses, no issues of non-compliance with laws and regulations, and no material errors in the accounting records were detected.

Ms. Farr stated that during the audit process, different audit areas were reviewed, such as internal controls, cash receipts, cash disbursements, payroll, and investments transactions. More time was spent to review the net pension liability and Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) liabilities. The net pension liability with LACERA increased over \$700,000 for Fiscal Year 2015-2016 from the prior Fiscal Year 2014-2015. Ms. Farr noted that a random sample of forty (40) transactions were utilized for the audit. Ms. Farr indicated that she had no issues to report, as expenditures were approved in accordance with policies, and documentation existed for the valid business purposes of LAFCO.

Ms. Farr stated that this is the first year that Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 72 requires that new disclosures of fair value measurements be shown on the financial statements. A footnote will now appear which was not shown on previous statements. Ms. Farr stated that comparable financial statements now appear on the financial statements to compare the current fiscal year and prior fiscal year.

Ms. Farr stated LAFCO staff was well-prepared for the audit and it was a pleasure working with them. In conclusion, Ms. Farr stated it was a clean audit and the accounting records were in excellent condition. Ms. Farr said she was available to answer any questions regarding the audit process or financial statements.

Commissioner Close asked if there is a strategy to address pension liabilities, as \$700,000 represents more than 50% of the gross revenue of the total budget. The E.O. stated that pension liabilities are the responsibility of Los Angeles County Employees Retirement Association (LACERA). The E.O. stated he is more concerned about OPEB liabilities, as this type of liability requires a pre-funding plan, and is a LAFCO responsibility. Ms. Farr stated that LAFCO is 86% funded for net pension liabilities which is a very large percentage for local government, and is largely due to LACERA's funding policies.

[Commissioner Ryu arrived at 9:25 a.m.]

Commissioner Close asked the E.O. to clarify what OPEB is. The E.O. stated OPEB is a change in the Federal standards relative to accounting. It requires that agencies document the cost of non-pension liabilities in retirement. Every three years there is an analysis of current retirees, current employees, life expectancies, and obligations to pre-fund those pensions. The E.O. stated that OPEB liabilities will be on the Agenda within the next couple of months with a recommendation from an outside agency that allows LAFCO to withdraw money from the reserve account to be set aside to pay for OPEB obligations only. Of the outstanding obligation of \$700,000, \$200,000 is already allocated to that obligation. The last several budgets approved by the Commission included increased assessments charged to member agencies (County, cities, and special districts) to defray the increased costs of insurance, pension liability, and OPEB liabilities.

Commissioner Barger asked the EO about the status of Workers Compensation insurance and disability insurance. The E.O. replied that he would report back on those issues at the Commission's February meeting.

Commissioner Barger asked if LAFCO is under new OPEB requirements mirrored by the County. The E.O. said "yes". Commissioner Barger stated the manner the County was funding retirement and health benefits was not sustainable. Newly hired employees will no longer have a "rich" retirement benefit when retired which will help "zero-down" liability costs. The E.O. stated that contributions in Plan "G" (for newer employees) are higher and the benefit retirement package is lower than in Plans "D" and "E" (for longer-serving employees).

Commissioner Smith asked Commissioner Barger when will those liabilities "catch up" and be sustainable. Commissioner Barger said it is projected to sustainable by 2030 or later. Commissioner Smith asked the E.O. if LAFCO is on the same track of the projected sustainability as the County. The E.O. stated LAFCO is on the same track as the County, and works closely with the County Chief Executive Officer and LACERA.

The E.O. summarized the staff report on the Draft Municipal Service Review and Sphere of Influence Update for the City of Commerce.

Commissioner Close asked the E.O. to briefly discuss what a Municipal Service Review is. The E.O. stated that a Municipal Service Review (MSR) is a "status report" on how a city or special district is providing service, financial status, cooperation with other agencies, and accountability. The byproduct of a MSR is a Sphere of Influence (SOI) Update. A city or special district cannot annex new territory unless it's within the city or special district SOI.

Commissioner Hahn asked if LAFCO is the only agency that performs Municipal Service Reviews. The E.O. answered "yes".

Commissioner Hahn asked if the City of Commerce has sunset provisions regarding sales tax. The E.O. stated that he does not know if the City of Commerce has a sales tax sunset provision.

The public hearing was opened to receive testimony. There being no testimony, the public hearing was closed.

FACTORS TO BE CONSIDERED PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE 56668:

a. Population:

The existing population is 0 residents as of March 30, 2016.

The population density issue does not apply because the affected territory is unpopulated.

The estimated future population is 0 residents (no anticipated change).

The affected territory is 1.76+/- acres. The existing land use is vacant. The proposed/future land use is a public library building.

The assessed valuation is \$147,897 as of March 30, 2016.

The per capita assessed valuation issue does not apply because the affected territory is unpopulated.

On August 2, 2016, the County adopted a negotiated tax exchange resolution; all other involved public agencies have adopted a property tax transfer resolution.

The topography of the affected territory is flat.

There are no natural boundaries.

There are no drainage basins on or near the affected territory.

The nearest populated area is immediately south west of the affected territory. The affected territory is likely to experience significant growth in the next ten years. The adjacent areas are likely to experience modest growth in the next ten years.

b. Governmental Services and Controls:

The affected territory will be developed to include one public library building which requires organized governmental services. The affected territory will require governmental services indefinitely.

The present cost and adequacy of governmental services and controls in the area are acceptable. With respect to sanitary sewage disposal, other than service provided by the District, the only alternative is private septic systems. The cost of sewage disposal by the District versus the cost by septic system is subject to multiple factors and varies widely. Service by the District is considered to be more reliable than septic systems. Service by the District is environmentally superior in terms of wastewater treatment, effluent discharge, and impacts on surface water bodies and groundwater.

c. Proposed Action and Alternative Actions:

The proposed action will have no significant effects on adjacent areas. The proposed action will have no effect on mutual social and economic interests. The proposal has no impact on the local governmental structure of the County.

The only alternate action for sewage disposal is a private septic system. Service by the District is considered to be more reliable than septic systems. Service by the District is environmentally superior in terms of wastewater treatment, effluent discharge, and impacts on surface water bodies and groundwater.

d. Conformity with Commission Policies on Urban Development and Open Space Conversion Policies:

There are no conformance issues because the Commission has not adopted any policies relative to providing planned, orderly, efficient patterns of urban development.

There is no prime agricultural land within or adjacent to the affected territory. The proposal conforms with the objectives in Government Code Sections 56377(a) and 56377(b).

e. Agricultural Lands:

There are no effects on agricultural lands, as defined. None of the land within the affected territory is currently used for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity for commercial purposes. According to the California Department of Conservation, Division of Land Resource Protection, none of the land within the affected territory is subject to a Land Conservation Act (aka "Williamson Act") contract nor in a Farmland Security Zone (California Land Conservation Act 2012 Status Report).

f. Boundaries:

The boundaries of the affected territory have been clearly defined by the applicant, and these boundaries have been reviewed and approved by LAFCO's GIS/Mapping Technician.

The boundaries conform to lines of assessment or ownership, and these boundaries have been reviewed and approved by LAFCO's GIS/Mapping Technician.

As a special district annexation, the proposal has no impact on existing city-county boundaries, nor does it create islands or corridors of unincorporated territory.

g. Consistency with Regional Transportation Plan:

The proposal has no significant impact upon, and is therefore consistent with, the Regional Transportation Plan.

h. Consistency with Plans:

The proposal is consistent with the existing County General Plan designation of Light Manufacturing (M-1).

The affected territory is not within the boundaries of any Specific Plan.

Pre-zoning is not a requirement for a special district proposal.

i. Sphere of Influence:

The affected territory is within the Sphere of Influence of the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 14.

j. Comments from Public Agencies:

Staff did not receive any significant comments from public agencies or any resolutions raising objections from any affected agency.

k. Ability to Provide Services:

Although the affected territory is not currently serviced by the District, the area was included in the future service area that might be served by the District. The District's future wastewater management needs were addressed in the Lancaster Water Reclamation Plant 2020 Facilities Plan.

l. Timely Availability of Water Supplies:

There are no known issues regarding water supply or delivery.

m. Regional Housing:

As a special district annexation, the proposal will not affect any city, nor the county, in achieving their respective fair shares of the regional housing needs as determined by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG).

n. Comments from Landowners, Voters, or Residents:

Staff did not receive any significant comments from landowners, voters, or residents.

o. Land Use Designations

The proposal is consistent with the existing County General Plan designation of Light Manufacturing (M-1).

The proposal is consistent with the existing County zoning designation of Light Manufacturing (M-1).

p. Environmental Justice:

All of the owners of real property within the affected territory have requested, in writing, that the District provide off-site sewage disposal service. Property-owners of adjacent areas did not request such service, and/or were contacted by Sanitation District staff and were not interested in securing such service or did not respond. The proposal promotes environmental justice, in that there is fair treatment of people of all races, cultures, and incomes with respect to the location of public facilities and the provision of public services.

There are no Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities (DUCs) within the affected territory, but there are DUC's directly north of the affected territory.

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT (CEQA) CLEARANCE:

<u>DETERMINATIONS WITHOUT NOTICE AND HEARING, AND WAIVER OF PROTEST PROCEEDINGS:</u>

Pursuant to Government Code Section 56662(a), the Commission may make determinations upon the proposed annexation without notice and hearing and may waive protest hearings for the reasons set forth herein. The territory is uninhabited. To date, no affected local agency has submitted a written demand for notice and hearing during the 10-day period referenced in Government Code Section 56662(c). Furthermore, the proposal was accompanied by satisfactory proof that all the landowners within the affected territory have given their written consent to the proposed annexation. Based thereon, the Commission may make determinations on the proposed annexation without notice and hearing, and the Commission may waive protest proceedings.

CONCLUSION:



FACTORS TO BE CONSIDERED PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE 56668:

a. Population:

The existing population is 4 residents as of May 27, 2016.

The population density is .92 persons per acre.

The estimated future population is 4 residents (no anticipated change).

The affected territory is 4.36+/- acres. The land use consists of one existing single-family home.

The assessed valuation is \$452,923 as of May 27, 2016.

The per capita assessed valuation is \$113,230.75.

On August 2, 2016, the County adopted a negotiated tax exchange resolution; all other involved public agencies have adopted a property tax transfer resolution.

The topography of the affected territory is flat.

There are no natural boundaries.

There are no drainage basins on or near the affected territory.

The affected territory is surrounded by populated areas on all sides.

The affected territory is likely to experience modest growth in the next ten years. The adjacent areas are likely to experience modest growth in the next ten years.

b. Governmental Services and Controls:

The affected territory consists of one single-family home which requires organized governmental services.

The present cost and adequacy of governmental services and controls in the area are acceptable. With respect to sanitary sewage disposal, other than service provided by the District, the only alternative is private septic systems. The cost of sewage disposal by the District versus the cost by septic system is subject to multiple factors and varies widely. Service by the District is considered to be more reliable than septic systems. Service by the District is environmentally superior in terms of wastewater treatment, effluent discharge, and impacts on surface water bodies and groundwater.

c. Proposed Action and Alternative Actions:

The proposed action will have no effect on adjacent areas. The proposed action will have no effect on mutual social and economic interests. The proposal has no impact on the local governmental structure of the County.

The only alternate action for sewage disposal is a private septic system. Service by the District is considered to be more reliable than septic systems. Service by the District is environmentally superior in terms of wastewater treatment, effluent discharge, and impacts on surface water bodies and groundwater.

d. Conformity with Commission Policies on Urban Development and Open Space Conversion Policies:

There are no conformance issues because the Commission has not adopted any policies relative to providing planned, orderly, efficient patterns of urban development.

There is no prime agricultural land within or adjacent to the affected territory. The proposal conforms with the objectives in Government Code Sections 56377(a) and 56377(b).

e. Agricultural Lands:

There are no effects on agricultural lands, as defined. None of the land within the affected territory is currently used for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity for commercial purposes. According to the California Department of Conservation, Division of Land Resource Protection, none of the land within the affected territory is subject to a Land Conservation Act (aka "Williamson Act") contract nor in a Farmland Security Zone (California Land Conservation Act 2012 Status Report).

f. Boundaries:

The boundaries of the affected territory have been clearly defined by the applicant, and these boundaries have been reviewed and approved by LAFCO's GIS/Mapping Technician.

The boundaries conform to lines of assessment or ownership, and these boundaries have been reviewed and approved by LAFCO's GIS/Mapping Technician.

As a special district annexation, the proposal has no impact on existing city-county boundaries, nor does it create islands or corridors of unincorporated territory.

g. Consistency with Regional Transportation Plan:

The proposal has no significant impact upon, and is therefore consistent with, the Regional Transportation Plan.

h. Consistency with Plans:

The proposal is consistent with the existing County General Plan designation of Residential 5 (H5).

The affected territory is not within the boundaries of any Specific Plan.

Pre-zoning is not a requirement for a special district proposal.

i. Sphere of Influence:

The affected territory is within the Sphere of Influence of the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 21.

j. Comments from Public Agencies:

Staff did not receive any significant comments from public agencies or any resolutions raising objections from any affected agency.

k. Ability to Provide Services:

Although the affected territory is not currently serviced by the District, the area was included in the future service area that might be served by the District. The District's future wastewater management needs were addressed in the Joint Outfall System 2010 Master Facilities Plan.

I. Timely Availability of Water Supplies:

There are no known issues regarding water supply or delivery.

m. Regional Housing:

As a special district annexation, the proposal will not affect any city, nor the county, in achieving their respective fair shares of the regional housing needs as determined by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG).

n. Comments from Landowners, Voters, or Residents:

Staff did not receive any significant comments from landowners, voters, or residents.

o. Land Use Designations

The proposal is consistent with the existing County General Plan designation of Residential 5 (H5).

The proposal is consistent with the existing County zoning designation of Light Agricultural (A-1-15000).

p. Environmental Justice:

All of the owners of real property within the affected territory have requested, in writing, that the District provide off-site sewage disposal service. Property-owners of adjacent areas did not request such service, and/or were contacted by Sanitation District staff and were not interested in securing such service or did not respond. The proposal promotes environmental justice, in that there is fair treatment of people of all races, cultures, and incomes with respect to the location of public facilities and the provision of public services.

There are no Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities (DUCs) within or adjacent to the affected territory.

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT (CEQA) CLEARANCE:

The proposal is categorically exempt from the provisions of CEQA pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15319(b) because it is an annexation of small parcels of the minimum size for facilities exempted by Section 15303(a), New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures. In addition, there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, nor other limiting factors that would make the exemption inapplicable based on the proposal records.

<u>DETERMINATIONS WITHOUT NOTICE AND HEARING, AND WAIVER OF PROTEST PROCEEDINGS:</u>

Pursuant to Government Code Section 56662(a), the Commission may make determinations upon the proposed annexation without notice and hearing and may waive protest hearings for the reasons set forth herein. The territory is uninhabited. To date, no affected local agency has submitted a written demand for notice and hearing during the 10-day period referenced in Government Code Section 56662(c). Furthermore, the proposal was accompanied by satisfactory proof that all the landowners within the affected territory have given their written consent to the proposed annexation. Based thereon, the Commission may make determinations on the proposed annexation without notice and hearing, and the Commission may waive protest proceedings.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends approval of the proposal as a logical and reasonable extension of Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 21 which will be for the interest of landowners and/or present and/or future inhabitants within the district and within the annexation territory.

Agenda Item No. 9.a. Deputy Executive Officer (DEO); Executive Officer Duties: Position Descriptions and Salary Ranges

Background:

Since LAFCO was established in 1963, the agency has always had two employees with management responsibilities (the EO and DEO). Collectively, these two individuals manage the five other LAFCO employees. Following the retirement of LAFCO DEO June Savala in November of 2016, the Executive Officer reviewed organizational responsibilities for all staff. The EO has concluded that LAFCO continues to require two managers, for the following reasons: one, the DEO manages the office when the EO is absent, thereby preserving a clear line of authority for all employees; two, if the EO is unavailable, the DEO could present staff reports and recommendations to the Commission; and three, for succession planning purposes.

At present, the EO and DEO are hired by, and enter into an employment agreement with the Commission. The Commission Chair executes any contracts or amendments on the Commission's behalf. For all other employees (three Local Government Analysts, the GIS Technician, and the Administrative Assistant/Secretary/Receptionist/Clerk), the EO handles all compensation issues and enters into individual employment agreements with each employee; the EO can make changes in compensation for these employees so long as the changes are within the approved salary range.

Requests:

Staff recommends a change from the current structure—wherein the DEO contracts with, and serves at the pleasure of, the Commission—to a structure in which the EO would have authority over the DEO. In Butte, Riverside, Orange, and Ventura LAFCOs, the DEO is at will and reports directly to the EO (some of these LAFCOs currently have vacancies for the comparable position). In most county, city, and special districts with a chief deputy (or equivalent), it is most often the case that these individuals serve at the pleasure of their direct manager. The EO recommends that the new position of LAFCO DEO be comparable.

Staff further recommends changing the existing Position Descriptions and Salary Schedule (last approved on August 8, 2012) to establish a compensation range for the DEO position, as noted below:

Deputy Executive Officer

Determined by Commission \$90,000 to 130,000

The proposed range is consistent with the salaries of other DEO's or their equivalent (Associate EO, Assistant EO) at other LAFCOs. It is anticipated that a new DEO would be hired at the low to mid-range of this schedule, to allow for compensation increases over time.

As noted, the EO currently handles all compensation issues and executes individual employment agreements with each employee; the EO can make changes in compensation for these employees so long as the changes are within the approved salary range. Should the Commission approve this request, the duties of the EO would be revised to include contracting for all other staff (as it is presently) but to now include the DEO position.

Finally, staff recommends that LAFCO advertise, recruit, interview, and hire a new DEO, as outlined in the attached schedule, subject to Commission approval of the proposed process. The recruitment would begin immediately and conclude in May, with a new DEO anticipated to commence work on or about June 1, 2017. This process would include substantial outreach, as noted on the enclosed exhibit.

To assist with the recruitment and screening process, staff has identified an outside consultant (Bob Aldrich of Aldrich & Associates) and a "Screening Panel" to assist with this recruitment effort.

Mr. Aldrich is a former employee or Orange LAFCO. He currently works as an independent contractor to Orange LAFCO and San Bernardino LAFCO, and he also works as a consultant preparing Municipal Service Reviews (MSRs), Sphere of Influence Updates, and special studies for LAFCOs. He formerly advised Orange LAFCO in its successful recruitment of an Executive Officer, Assistant Executive Officer, and two Analyst positions. Mr. Aldrich would advertise the recruitment, receive and review applicants to ensure that they meet the minimum qualifications, and coordinate the meeting(s) and/or conference call(s) of the Screening Panel.

The Screening Panel would consist of a representative of the Commission (Chair Jerry Gladbach) and representatives of the County of Los Angeles, cities in Los Angeles County, special districts in Los Angeles County, and the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County. These individuals have agreed, at no cost to the Commission, to screen applications, interview a maximum of ten qualified applicants, and recommend a maximum of four finalists to the EO. The Executive Officer would interview the finalists, make the final selection, and report to the Commission at the Commission's May or June meeting, and prior to negotiating and finalizing a contract with the selected individual.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Commission:

1. Approve the following Position Description and Salary Range:

THE AGENCY:

The Local Agency Formation Commission for the County of Los Angeles (LA LAFCO) is an agency of the State of California responsible for overseeing the establishment, expansion, and reorganization of local government agency boundaries and service territory. LA LAFCO draws its regulatory and planning powers from the State Legislature, with directives to encourage orderly growth, promote logical agency boundaries, discourage urban sprawl, preserve open space and prime agricultural lands. There are presently 88 cities and 91 special districts under LA LAFCO's jurisdiction.

The staff of LA LAFCO reports to a 15-member Commission (9 voting members and 6 alternate members) composed mostly of elected officials representing the County of Los Angeles, cities in Los Angeles County, and independent special districts in Los Angeles County. In addition to the Executive Officer and Deputy Executive Officer, there are five full-time employees.

THE POSITION:

Los Angeles LAFCO is currently recruiting for its Deputy Executive Officer (DEO). This is a full-time, at-will, management position that serves at the pleasure of, and reports to, LA LAFCO's Executive Officer. The DEO provides overall project management for the programs of LA LAFCO as established by State law and adopted policy. The DEO provides overall project planning, analysis, proposal recommendations and management on routine city and district annexations, complex jurisdictional changes such as the consolidation or dissolution of special districts, the proposed formation of new special districts, and the proposed incorporation of new cities.

Key duties of the DEO include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Provide overall project planning and analysis of routine and complex annexations and reorganizations of cities and special districts;
- Provide supervision to administrative staff and oversight of day-to-day agency operations.
- Participate in the budget preparation process;
- Work with outside financial consultants (accountant, auditor, and bookkeeper) in the formulation and presentation of LA LAFCO's financial statements;
- Interact with third-party vendors (computer consultant, financial institutions, insurance agencies, and suppliers) to address on-going needs of the agency;
- Interface with LA LAFCO's legal counsel concerning the preparation of all staff reports and agenda items, and to insure compliance with all relevant Federal, State, and local laws concerning both agency procedures and human resource/personnel issues;
- As needed, provide direction to consulting teams on specific projects;
- Prepare analyses and present project reports with related recommendations to the Executive Officer, Local Agency Formation Commission, city councils, and community and homeowner organizations on proposed jurisdictional changes, especially on complex and contentious reorganizations;
- Advise representatives of cities, special districts, and the County of Los Angeles; as well as landowners and registered voters; concerning proposed applications to LA LAFCOs;
- Manage the preparation and update of Municipal Service Reviews (MSRs) and Spheres of Influence (SOIs) for each city and special district in Los Angeles County;
- Make presentations to the Commission at monthly meetings; and
- Other duties as assigned by the Executive Officer.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

At minimum, successful candidates must have:

- A Bachelor's Degree in Planning, Geography, Public Policy, Political Science, Public Administration, Business Administration or a closely related field of study.
- A minimum of four years of experience working with a LAFCO, county, city, special district or other local government agency either directly or as a consultant. This requirement may be substituted with equivalent service in the private sector, but only to the extent that the individual has substantial experience working with local public agencies.
- Familiarity with the Cortese-Knox Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 and the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).
- Excellent public speaking and writing skills.
- Strong computer and project management skills.

DESIRABLE QUALIFICATIONS

Although not part of the minimum qualifications, the following qualifications are desirable:

- Familiarity with the Subdivision Map Act, State planning and zoning laws, and property tax exchange laws.
- A Master's Degree in one of these fields of study (or closely related field).
- A general understanding of budget preparation techniques for local government agencies.
- Prior experience managing employees.

The ideal candidate will be one that presents a combination of experience, education and training which substantially demonstrates that the candidate can:

- Professionally represent the agency before the Commission, elected officials and staff, community and business groups, and the general public;
- Show sound judgment and operate with honesty and integrity in all interactions;
- Manage and motivate staff; and

BENEFITS

Legislative Update

Because the 2017-2018 Legislative Session just got underway, staff has yet to receive any drafts of proposed bills (and, in many instances, legislative authors have yet to be determined). Staff anticipates, however, that several bills of interest will be available and presented at your March 8th Commission meeting for consideration. Based upon discussions with CALAFCO staff and others, staff anticipates the introduction of the following bills:

- <u>Assembly Local Government Committee (ALGC) Omnibus Bill.</u> CALAFCO has
 submitted one item for the Omnibus Bill to the ALGC, which clarifies LAFCO authority
 to collect fees for the preparation of Municipal Service Reviews (MSRs). Upon
 introduction, staff anticipates a future request that the Commission take a position in
 support.
- <u>Proposed Bill concerning Government Code Section 56653.</u> CALAFCO has requested the introduction of a bill that would amend the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 (the Act) to address a court ruling (City of Patterson v. Turlock Irrigation District, June 26, 2014) unfavorable to LAFCOs. The Turlock decision arguably impedes a LAFCO's ability to request a plan for services if a district is already providing services in the affected territory.
- California Special Districts Association (CSDA) Bill Concerning Seating of Special
 <u>Districts on LAFCO</u>. Since 1972, the Act has authorized the addition of special district
 commissioners on LAFCOs. At present, 30 of the 58 LAFCOs have special district
 representatives. CSDA's proposal would streamline the process and make it significantly
 easier for the remaining 28 LAFCOs to add special district commissioners.
- Consolidation of the Castaic Lake Water Agency (CLWA) and the Newhall County Water District (NCWD). At a combined board of directors meeting in December of 2016, the boards of the CLWA and the NCWD voted to pursue state legislation to consolidate the two agencies into a new water district. Staff expects that a draft of the proposed bill will be available in the next week or two.
