FY 2020-21 Mid-Year Budget Status Report

<u>Summary</u>: In accordance with Government Code Section 56381, the Commission adopted a budget for FY 2020-21 on June 10, 2020, prior to the statutory requirement of June 15th. Consistent with prior years, staff herein presents a summary of budgetary revenues and expenses through the middle of the fiscal year, as well as projections for the end of the current fiscal year (FY 2020-21 ends on June 30, 2021).

This mid-year budget status report incorporates recent expenditure changes and provides an overview of the projected year-end position in comparison to the adopted budget. Staff anticipates that 2020-21 expenditures will be approximately 10% below the Commission adopted budget. This is largely due to projected year-end savings in several areas (conference and travel, consulting services for MSRs, accounting/bookkeeping fees, and property/liability insurance), as described in more detail below. Should projections bear out at year end (June 30, 2021), savings of approximately \$150,000 will become available for next year's budget (FY 2021-22), to be considered by the Commission in March and April of this year. This also takes into account a modest portion of revenues expected to be below target.

Provided herein is a brief narrative description of the budget categories identifying significant variations from the adopted budget, followed by a spreadsheet providing details on all expenditures and revenues.

Expenditures:

Salaries and Employee Benefits: The Salaries and Employee Benefits are expected to be below the adopted budget by 4.1% as described in more detail below.

Employee Salaries (50001): Cost savings were achieved due to employee's medical leave, paid by LAFCO's disability insurance carrier and cost of living increases being approximately one percent below budget.

<u>Retirement (50015)</u>: As a LACERA participatory agency, LAFCO is subject to employer contribution rate increases. Although employer contribution rates were increased by approximately 1.5%, LAFCO was able to absorb the increase. Also included is an estimated administrative fee quoted by LACERA for managing existing retirees' health benefits.

<u>OPEB—Existing Retiree (50022)</u>: This account reflects existing LAFCO retirees' post-employment benefits, which include the portion of benefits paid by LAFCO. This also includes survivor benefits, which were paid out for the first time in the current fiscal year.

Office Expenses: Office Expenses are projected to be below budgeted levels by 18.6%.

Rent (50025): The office lease allows for an annual 3% rent increase escalator. The lease also calls for LAFCO to pay its proportionate share of common area maintenance fees ("CAMs"). CAMs were slightly higher than budgeted, causing a slight increase in rent expenditures of less than a percent.

<u>Property/Liability Insurance (50032)</u>: The Commission recently switched insurance carriers for property and liability insurance, resulting in nearly \$13,000 in savings.

<u>Conferences/Travel—Commissioners (50057) and Conferences/Travel—Staff (50058)</u>: These accounts include budgeted expenses for attendance in CALAFCO Conferences, Workshops, and University Sessions, as well as mileage reimbursements. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the CALAFCO Conference and annual workshop have been postponed, and travel to meetings is no longer required. Most orders of business are being conducted virtually, resulting in significant cost savings in these accounts. Projected year-end expenses in these accounts are expected to be 96% below budget.

Miscellaneous—Other (50065): This account includes charges by the County of Los Angeles for the use of the Board room, County services such as County Assessor fees, monthly bank charges, and other miscellaneous charges. At mid-year, expenses in this account are minimal. Most expenses in this account are related to County Assessor parcel fees up to an amount of \$1,500 per change of organization or reorganization (this charge is reimbursed by the applicant), which have been minimal.

<u>Computer-Copier-Misc. Equipment (50067)</u>: This account is used as a placeholder to replace computer equipment such as monitors, printers, and keyboards. These types of replacements seldom occur. This fiscal year, a few items were purchased to accommodate telecommuting.

Professional Services: Professional Services are also expected to be below budget. This is largely due to the costs associated with the preparation of Municipal Service Reviews.

<u>Legal Services (50076)</u>: LAFCO utilizes County Counsel for legal services. The amount budgeted is consistent with the amount charged in prior years. The amount listed in the attached spreadsheet reflects counsel invoices paid through November of 2020. Due to cancellation of the December 2020 LAFCO meeting, and less controversial proposals being considered in the current fiscal year, year-end expenditures are expected to be slightly below budget by approximately 6%.

<u>Payroll Service (50077.1)</u>: LAFCO uses an outside vendor for payroll services. Charges to this account are for inputting time, processing payroll and generating checks.

Municipal Service Reviews (50081): The amount included in the budget reflects the Commission's initiative to complete MSRs during the current fiscal year by contracting for outside consultant services. Since the budget's adoption, the Commission has completed its contract with three of the selected consulting firms and has not executed any additional contracts for the preparation of MSR/SOI Updates. The projected year-end amount includes the contract amount for the remaining MSR/SOI Updates contract.

Expenditure Summary:

In summary, it is anticipated that the total expenditures will be approximately 10% below budgeted expenditures of \$1,658,753, mostly related to cost savings in property/liability, conference, travel, municipal service reviews, consulting, and accounting/bookkeeping fees.

Revenues:

At mid-year, fee revenues are significantly lower than the budgeted amount by 80%. Although staff has been working with applicants for the filing of reorganization proposals, fee generating revenue is always an estimate and outside of LAFCO's control. Due to a decrease in interest earnings of over one percent, interest revenue is also below budget. At the close of the fiscal year, fee-based revenues and interest income are expected to be less than budgeted revenues by 31%. This decrease in filing fees, processing fees, interest income, and other revenues—all of which are unpredictable from year to year, are unlikely to have an appreciable impact on the FY 2020-21 budget by the end of the current fiscal year.

Local Agency Apportionment:

The Los Angeles County Auditor Controller has collected 100% of the FY 2020-21 local agency apportionment from local agencies in Los Angeles County (assessments collected from the County of Los Angeles, the cities of Los Angeles County, and the independent special districts of Los Angeles County).

Conclusion:

Given the foregoing, staff expects to propose a relatively similar budget for FY 2021-22, one which will see minimal changes compared to the current fiscal year adopted budget. Even with anticipated increases in some expenses (medical/dental insurance premiums, employer pension contributions, and rent), staff anticipates that the net fiscal year's assessments collected from the County of Los Angeles, the cities of Los Angeles County, and the independent special districts of Los Angeles County, will remain the same as the current fiscal year.

Staff continues to address LAFCO's long term Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) obligations. To date, the Commission has deposited \$200,000 in the California Employers' Retiree Benefit Trust (CERBT) fund (the balance as of 12/31/20, due to earnings and interest, is now \$255,019). A consultant is preparing an actuarial valuation of LAFCO's current OPEB

Obligations, as required every three years by the Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB). Upon receipt of the valuation (expected by the end of February 2021), and consistent with prior communication with the Commission, staff will deposit an additional \$100,000 in the CERBT fund, bringing the total funding to \$355,019. (LAFCO is unable to make any contributions until the actuarial valuation is completed.) Depending on two factors—1) a determination of the final revenues for FY 2020-21, and 2) the Commission's adoption of the FY 2021-22 Budget, staff may recommend that the Commission make an additional deposit into the CERBT fund in the 2021-22 fiscal year.

Mid-Year Investment Report

Background: Commission funds are held in three accounts: an operating account, an operating reserve account in the County Treasury, and a separate government entity bank account used to pay the Commission's monthly operating expenses. The County Auditor-Controller collects the LAFCO apportionment, which is deposited into the Commission's operating account. Each month, funds are transferred from the operating account to the Commission's government entity bank account to pay the Commission's operating expenditures, consistent with Commission-approved appropriations.

Commission funds held in the County Treasury accrue interest. All interest earnings are included in the Commission's budget under Interest Income (40007). At this time staff would like to report the mid-year status of investment earnings.

In addition, in May of 2018, the Commission established a Other-Post-Employment-Benefits (OPEB) Trust fund in order to reduce its unfunded OPEB liability. LAFCO funds for its OPEB liability are held in the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS)—California Employers' Retirement Benefit Trust (CERBT) Fund. Funds held in CERBT also accrue interest.

Interest Earnings:

The average earning rate since the beginning of the fiscal year for those funds held in the County Treasury has been declining steadily. As of December 31, 2020, the earning rate was 0.54%, which is over a one percent decrease from December of 2019. Interest Income gained since the beginning of the fiscal year through the most recent Monthly Report of Investments is approximately \$4,583. Projected year end Interest Income is expected to be approximately 57% below the amount approved in the Commission's annual budget for FY 2020-21.

CERBT Interest earnings for the current fiscal year have accrued at a net return of 10.26%, as of December 31, 2020, which is unprecedented in comparison to last year's return rate of 3.34% (based on the FY 2019-20 Mid-Year Report on Investments). In the current fiscal year, net interest earnings have been \$28,784, as of the most recent quarterly information available.

Procurement and Reporting Policy Adopted May 8, 2019

This policy shall apply to all contracts entered into by the Local Agency Formation Commission for the County of Los Angeles (LAFCO), as authorized by Government Code §§ 56375 (j), 56375(k), and 56380 which authorize the Commission to appoint and assign staff personnel, to employ or contract for professional or consulting services, and to incur usual and necessary expenses to carry out and effect the functions of the Commission and to make its own provision for necessary quarters, equipment and supplies.

This policy is intended to ensure that LAFCO practices ethical, responsible, and reasonable procedures relative to purchasing, financial commitments, contracts, and the hiring of consultants. This policy identifies the procedures which LAFCO will adhere to in the performance of its designated responsibilities, and it is intended to provide for a cost-effective use of public resources, including funds and staff time. This policy applies to LAFCO's contracting practices prospectively, after adoption of the policy by the Commission.

1. Commission Approval

Execution and award of contracts, agreements, and memoranda of understanding (collectively referred to as contracts) that exceed \$10,000, including but not limited to the those for the following types of services shall require Commission approval:

- Preparation of annual audits (this may be awarded in contracts for multiple years, and in concert with other LAFCOs);
- Municipal Service Reviews (MSRs), special studies, and/or equivalent;
- Lease(s), or lease extensions, for office space;
- Primary legal counsel and as-needed alternate counsel;
- Provider(s) of insurance, including employee medical/dental, property/liability, and workers compensation insurance coverage; and
- Provider(s) of employee pension coverage.

Contracts that require Commission approval shall utilize a competitive solicitation process in a form determined by the Executive Officer and approved by LAFCO legal counsel. Prior Commission authorization to release the solicitation is not required.

2. Delegated Authority:

The Commission hereby delegates authority to the Executive Officer to solicit, approve and execute contracts for goods, materials and services that do not exceed \$10,000 and are consistent with the authority provided by Government Code §§ 56375 and 56380. It is expected that this will include, but is not limited to, the following: computer equipment, (including desktop and laptop computers, printers, routers, servers, wireless networks, and similar and related products); miscellaneous services/leases (cell phone(s), postage meter, and plant service); and any other service or product not to exceed \$10,000. Notwithstanding the above, the Commission delegates authority to the Executive Officer to purchase and/or contract for legal advertising (public notice), routine information

Delegated Authority (continued):

technology services, and accounting/bookkeeping services, which exceed \$10,000, provided that these costs are documented in the annual budgets adopted by the Commission, identified in the Mid-Year Budget Report, and listed in the "Procurement and Reporting Policy Annual Report" identified in Section 4, below.

The Executive Officer is authorized to designate the Deputy Executive Officer ("DEO") as his or her designee for all delegated authority herein. In the absence or unavailability of the Executive Officer, the Commission hereby delegates the foregoing authority to the DEO.

Delegated authority for contracts that are estimated to exceed \$5,000 shall utilize a competitive solicitation process in a form determined by the Executive Officer and approved by LAFCO legal counsel.

3. Emergency Authority

In the event of an emergency issue, as determined by the Executive Officer in consultation with the Commission Chair (or, if unavailable, with the Commission First Vice-Chair or Commission Second Vice Chair); when equipment, materials or services are required to protect the health, welfare and safety of the Commission or staff, and the cost exceeds the delegated authority of the Executive Officer; the Executive Officer shall receive approval of the Commission Chair (or, if unavailable, with the Commission First Vice-Chair or Commission Second Vice Chair); to award a contract and waive the requirements to conduct a competitive solicitation process. The Executive Officer shall notify the Commission either in writing or in a report at the next available Commission Meeting.

4. Reporting Requirements:

Staff shall prepare a written "Procurement and Reporting Policy Annual Report" ("Report") and agendize the same at a Commission meeting in the first quarter of each calendar year. The Report shall list all outside service providers, and shall include, but not be limited to, the name of the provider; the service/product provided; and the status/term of any contracts, leases, or equivalent.

The Report shall be prepared annually and posted to the LAFCO website. The most recent five (5) years of Reports shall be maintained in the "Transparency" section of the LAFCO website.

5. Conflict(s) of Interest:

LAFCO shall avoid real or potential conflicts of interest in its contracting practices. Contracts shall not be entered into with members of the Commission, LAFCO employees, and vendors in which Commissioners or LAFCO employees have a financial or ownership interest. This provision extends to those who within the immediately preceding 12 months were Commission members or employees of LAFCO who participated in the area of service performed or developing the contract or its service specifications.

Legislative Update and Request to Take as "Support" Position Relative to Anticipated Legislation to amend Government Code § 56133(e)

Legislation:

Due to delays associated with COVID-19 restrictions, the Legislature has gotten off to a slow start in 2021. Staff expects that several bills which failed in last year's session will be re-introduced in 2021. The Assembly Local Government Committee is expected to introduce its annual Omnibus Bill to address technical changes to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000; the CALAFCO Legislative Committee, including the Executive Officer, is actively involved in the development of this bill.

Staff reports on the following two (2) bills:

- <u>SB 55 (Stern)</u>: Introduced by Senator Henry Stern on December 7, 2020, SB 55 would prohibit the creation or approval of a new development, as defined, in a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone (VHFHSZ) or a State Responsibility Area (SRA). CALAFCO has taken a "watch" position on SB 55.
- AB 11 (Ward): Introduced by Assemblyman Chris Ward on December 7, 2020, AB 11 would require the Strategic Growth Council to establish up to 12 regional climate change authorities to coordinate climate adaptation and mitigation activities in their regions, and coordinate with other regional climate adaptation authorities, state agencies, and other relevant stakeholders. CALAFCO has taken a "watch" position on AB 11.

Anticipated Legislation to Amend Government Code § 56133(e)

Existing law (Government Code § 56133) states that cities and special districts need to request and receive LAFCO approval before entering contracts to provide services outside their jurisdictional boundaries. The law includes a limited number of exceptions in subsection (e) that do not require formal approval, such as contracts between two or more public agencies where the contract services are alternatives and equal substitutes for services already provided.

While most local governmental agencies appropriately check-in with LAFCOs to assess exception eligibility, not all do, and some have chosen to "self-exempt" themselves and contract-in and/or contract-out key municipal services that otherwise merit LAFCO review and approval pursuant to the statute. This issue has arisen on multiple occasions in San Diego County in the last three years, including:

- 1. City of Coronado and City of Imperial Beach
- 2. Greater San Diego County Resource Conservation District and Mission Resource Conservation District
- 3. Tri City Health Care District and Palomar Health Care District

San Diego LAFCO has expended considerable time, effort, and resources addressing these and other exemption issues, and has incurred significant costs on outside legal counsel. San Diego LAFCO is, therefore, seeking support from other LAFCOs for proposed legislation to amend Government Code § 56133(e) to state, explicitly, that LAFCO must determine an agency's eligibility to receive an exception (copy attached). As noted by San Diego Executive Officer Keene Simonds, "This simple amendment would help ensure decisions by public agencies to contract-in and/or contract-out key services are appropriately vetted and eliminates the potential for disputes and their associated costs when local agencies proceed without check-ins and things go south thereafter."

In 2014, the Commission (LA LAFCO) approved an exemption (Out-of-Agency Service Agreement No. 2014-08) to allow retail water service in unincorporated Hacienda Heights and the City of La Habra Heights by the City of La Habra Utility Authority. Given the issues raised by that exemption request, the Commission adopted a policy in 2015 (see attached) which requires cities and special districts to secure LA LAFCO approval, in writing and in advance, before the agency provides service outside its jurisdictional boundaries. Several other LAFCOs have adopted similar policies.

Rather than the current policy-based approach, the legislation proposed by San Diego LAFCO would provide statutory authority to all LAFCOs to require advance approval relative to eligibility for an exception under Government Code § 56133 (e). Given its consistency with existing Commission policy, staff recommends that the Commission take a "SUPPORT" position on this proposed legislation.

Should the Commission have questions about the proposed legislation, LAFCO Executive Officer Keene Simonds will be available during today's virtual meeting.

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that the Commission:

- 1. Receive and file the Legislative Update; and
- 2. Take a "SUPPORT" position relative to anticipated legislation to amend Government Code § 56133(e), authorize the Chair to sign letters documenting this position, and direct staff to convey this support the Governor, legislators, and other stakeholders.

Government Code Section 56133 Proposed Amendment Regarding Exception Determination

56133.

- (a) A city or district may provide new or extended services by contract or agreement outside its jurisdictional boundary only if it first requests and receives written approval from the commission.
- (b) The commission may authorize a city or district to provide new or extended services outside its jurisdictional boundary but within its sphere of influence in anticipation of a later change of organization.
- (c) If consistent with adopted policy, the commission may authorize a city or district to provide new or extended services outside its jurisdictional boundary and outside its sphere of influence to respond to an existing or impending threat to the health or safety of the public or the residents of the affected territory, if both of the following requirements are met:
- (1) The entity applying for approval has provided the commission with documentation of a threat to the health and safety of the public or the affected residents.
- (2) The commission has notified any alternate service provider, including any water corporation as defined in Section 241 of the Public Utilities Code, that has filed a map and a statement of its service capabilities with the commission.
- (d) The executive officer, within 30 days of receipt of a request for approval by a city or district to extend services outside its jurisdictional boundary, shall determine whether the request is complete and acceptable for filing or whether the request is incomplete. If a request is determined not to be complete, the executive officer shall immediately transmit that determination to the requester, specifying those parts of the request that are incomplete and the manner in which they can be made complete. When the request is deemed complete, the executive officer shall place the request on the agenda of the next commission meeting for which adequate notice can be given but not more than 90 days from the date that the request is deemed complete, unless the commission has delegated approval of requests made pursuant to this section to the executive officer. The commission or executive officer shall approve, disapprove, or approve with conditions the extended services. If the new or extended services are disapproved or approved with conditions, the applicant may request reconsideration, citing the reasons for reconsideration.
- (e) This section does not apply to any of the following <u>as determined by the commission</u> or the executive officer:
- (1) Two or more public agencies where the public service to be provided is an alternative to, or substitute for, public services already being provided by an existing public service provider and where the level of service to be provided is consistent with the level of service contemplated by the existing service provider.
- (2) The transfer of nonpotable or nontreated water.
- (3) The provision of surplus water to agricultural lands and facilities, including, but not limited to, incidental residential structures, for projects that serve conservation purposes or that directly support agricultural industries. However, prior to extending surplus

water service to any project that will support or induce development, the city or district shall first request and receive written approval from the commission in the affected county.

- (4) An extended service that a city or district was providing on or before January 1, 2001.
- (5) A local publicly owned electric utility, as defined by Section 9604 of the Public Utilities Code, providing electric services that do not involve the acquisition, construction, or installation of electric distribution facilities by the local publicly owned electric utility, outside of the utility's jurisdictional boundary.
- (6) A fire protection contract, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 56134.
- (f) This section applies only to the commission of the county in which the extension of service is proposed.

Requesting an Out-of-Agency Service Extension or Exemption Pursuant to Government Code Sections 56133 and 56134

Adopted February 11, 2015 Revised May 13, 2015 Revised March 9, 2016

Background:

Unless determined by the Commission to be exempt, a city or district may provide new or extended services by contract outside its jurisdictional boundaries only if it first requests and receives written approval from the Commission.

Procedures for Requests Pursuant to Government Code Section 56133:

If a request pursuant to Government Code Section 56133 is filed by a party other than the city of district which would provide the service, the affected city or district must provide a written endorsement indicating its willingness to provide the service if the Commission approves the request.

The Commission shall consider any proposals for an out-of-agency service extension, either pursuant to Government Code Section 56133(b), if a future change of organization or reorganization is anticipated, or pursuant to Government Code Section 56133(c), if the Commission finds that there is an existing or impending threat to public health or safety of the residents of the affected territory.

The Commission shall also consider any requests to be exempt from the requirement to obtain LAFCO approval of an out-of-agency service extension, pursuant to Government Code Section 56133(e).

LAFCO shall publish a notice no less than 21 days in advance of the public hearing before the Commission, consistent with Government Code sections 56153-56154, except as otherwise provided herein.

If the Executive Officer determines that an out-of-agency request is associated with an urgent situation where the public interest requires action in less than 21 days, the Executive Officer may waive the 21-day notice and agendize the matter before the Commission as a special meeting, which may be by teleconference, pursuant to the requirements of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code Section 54950 et seq) with the concurrence of the Commission Chair, or if the Chair is unavailable, the concurrence of the First Vice Chair, or Second Vice Chair as may be available.

Requesting an Out-of-Agency Service Extension or Exemption Pursuant to Government Code Sections 56133 and 56134 Page 2 of 2

Procedures for Requests Pursuant to Government Code Section 56134:

The Commission shall consider any proposals for an out-of-agency service extension for fire protection contracts consistent with the provisions of Government Code Section 56134.

Reconsideration

Government Code Sections 56133 and 56134 provide that requests for reconsideration may be made by the applicant. It is the policy of the Commission to also consider requests for reconsideration filed by any person or affected agency. Reconsideration shall be subject to the procedures and requirements established in Government Code Section 56895, except as provided herein.
